St Lawrence Family Formation

If I were to ask you, "Who is in charge of raising kids?" most people wouldn't hesitate to say, "the parents!" Because of course it's the parents, who else would it be? And then if I were to ask you, "Who is in charge of raising kids in the Catholic faith?" still most people would quickly answer, "the parents...but maybe with some help from the Church..." And that also makes good sense; after all, it takes a village to raise a child. But then if I were to ask you, "HOW does someone raise their kids in the Catholic faith?" Suddenly things become a lot less clear.

For a long time, the Church has played an important role in supporting parents in their efforts to raise their kids well. Through programs like CCD and sacramental prep and even youth ministry, we've got lots of programs where you can take your kids and have another adult help to pass on the faith to your kids. But the Church doesn't always have a lot in the way of helping the parents themselves to be better, more faithful Catholics parents who are raising faithful Catholic kids. But we're going to try to change that. we've created a parents group that meets during the CCD hour. For this first year of the group, we'll be reading and discussing the book *Forming Families, Forming Saints* by Fr. Carter Griffin (who Fr. Steve went to seminary with). In this book, Fr. Griffin takes the best of our tradition's wisdom in forming holy men and women, and begins to ask the question of what that might look like in a family setting.

This is not some academic class, no one is going to be lecturing on parental theory, instead it's a group of parishioners coming together to discuss what it actually looks like to be Catholic parents raising kids in a Catholic home. We will meet in the Family Life Center each week that CCD is in session. Books will cost \$10 and be on sale after mass in the Family Life Center. St Lawrence Reading Scripture

The Minor Prophets

Introduction

The writings of the prophets are where we truly get to see the heart of God on display. However, they aren't always an easy set of books to read. The background for all of the writings of the prophets is the Covenant, the agreement between God and the Israelites where God promises to protect his people and make them prosper, and in return they agree to live by his ways. He will be our God, and we will be his people.

The covenant of the Old Testament is the whole framework around which our religion is built. It's where God makes known his desire to know and love us and tells us what it looks like to walk with him in the life that we were made for. However, here's the problem: The covenant only works if both sides are faithful, both we and God. And the scriptures make clear that God has been nothing but faithful to us. But we haven't always been so keen on keeping our side of things. Which is where the prophets come in. We have this image of a prophet as a kind of fortune teller. But the reality is

that the prophets are those whom God has sent to warn Israel that they aren't keeping the covenant. The prophets give warning that, according to the terms of the covenant laid out by Moses, failure to keep the covenant, especially by chasing after other gods and idols, means God will cast them out and their nation will be destroyed. Which is exactly what happened. As generations passed by the Israelites strayed further and further from God, until he finally withdrew his protection and allowed his people to be conquered by other nations. But there's the twist. Though God is constantly warning the Israelites of their impending destruction if they do not change their ways, he also promises that their downfall will never be the end of the story. No matter how faithless the Israelites may become, God will never give up on them and will always work hard to bring his people back to him. And we see that come to its ultimate fulfillment with the New Covenant instituted by Jesus. Sin and transgression are overcome once and for all and we have a sure path back to our creator. Over the next month, we'll be reading from a few of the "minor prophets". Through these samplings we'll see this progression of prophets, ranging from warnings from Hosea and Joel, to promises of future restoration in books like Haggai and Malachi.

Hosea

The book of Hosea is written to remind the people of God to keep the covenant. The book is written with a contrast of blessings and curses, but nothing in Hosea is new; he is just reminding the Israelites of the terms of the covenant of Moses. So far God is pretty disappointed in how faithless the people have been. And God is reminding the people here that, just as promised, destruction is coming for those who reject his ways. But he is also reassuring us that even if this destruction comes to his people, it won't last forever. Through it he will bring his people back to him.

Joel

Similar to Hosea, Joel is reminding the people that destruction is the punishment for breaking the covenant, but also like Hosea, Joel is promising future deliverance. What makes Joel stand out is how it runs alongside Deuteronomy 32, pulling straight from the promises of the original covenant itself.

Micah

The book of Micah is written shortly before the fall of Israel and Judah to surrounding empires. After the prophets before him warned that the people were not keeping the covenant, and therefore God would allow their destruction, Micah proclaims that the time for warning has passed and judgement has now come. Israel will be destroyed (and was, indeed, conquered by her neighbors). But as with all prophets, there is still hope. This destruction isn't the final word for the people of God, but God repeats his vow that he will restore them again.

Haggai

This book appears odd at first glance, its mostly concerned with construction of a temple, which is odd given that the people of God have been exiled from the promised land and couldn't build a temple even if they wanted to. But the message of the prophet is clear, the time of being disciplined has come to an end, and the time to rebuild is here. However, the real restoration isn't about making a new temple of wood and stone, rather the true rebuilding of the people will be as their hearts turn back to God.

Malachi

A fitting book to end this series of prophets, God assures the people that he still loves them and intends to restore the covenant. He reminds the people where they went wrong in the first place but also encourages the people that he is a God that judges according to the heart. If we repent and return to him, we will always find a loving and forgiving God.

Deacon Frank was incardinated in Lexington Diocese on August 20th

Deacon Frank was born in Mexico and grew up in Chicago with 6 brothers and sisters. At 18 he enlisted in the US Army and met his wife, Monika while stationed in Germany. After 21yrs in the Army, Frank heard the call to serve as a deacon for the church. He began serving as the Pastoral Associate for Annunciation Parish and entered the diaconate formation program for the Archdiocese of Louisville. He was ordained on August 22, 2008. In 2010 became the Director for Hispanic Ministry for the Archdiocese of Louisville. In 2013 he became the director of worship and youth ministry for St. Bartholomew in Louisville and was later assigned to Holy Name in Louisville. While on leave of absence from ministry, Deacon Frank and his wife began attending Holy Mass at St Lawrence where Monika fell in love and convinced Deacon Frank to ask for a reassignment to St Lawrence. After 3 years of discernment by the diocese of Lexington and Deacon Frank to see if he was a good fit, Deacon Frank requested an excardination from the Archdiocese Louisville and incardination into the diocese of Lexington. Both Archbishop Shelton and Bishop John met and agreed he would be a good fit. We would like to congratulate Deacon Frank and wish him well as he accepts his new assignment here at St Lawrence.

General Offertory Funds are used to support the day-to-day-operational expenses such as office supplies, printing, church supplies, payroll, and utilities. **Building Fund collections** go towards facility upkeep and maintenance. Soon we will be having the hoods in the kitchens cleaned to prevent any fires and to remain in compliance with our insurance policy. The AED in the FLC is being replaced with a Zoll model.
