Reflections on Parts of the Mass

Forgiveness at Mass

The Sacrament of Penance is the Church's special celebration of pardon, but forgiveness of sins is also one of the fruits of the Mass. There are many moments throughout the Eucharistic celebration when the texts and gestures of the Mass express the community's sorrow for sins.

We begin with the Penitential Act, which includes striking the breast in a simple gesture of sorrow. The presider then asks that God have mercy on us and forgive our sins. On Sundays, this penitential rite may be replaced with a sprinkling rite, signifying our purification.

While singing the Glory to God and the Lamb of God, we ask the One who takes away the sins of the world to have mercy on us.

When the deacon or priest kisses the Gospel, he prays that its words may wipe away our sins. While washing his hands, the priest asks God to wash away his iniquity and cleanse him of sin.

During the Lord's Prayer, we all ask God to forgive us our sins.

And, of course, the sharing of Communion itself forgives sins (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1393–1394).

The main purposes of Mass are to express thanks and praise to God and to sanctify the assembly through Holy Communion. But one of the other results is the forgiveness of sins.

The faithful who are aware of grave sin should celebrate the Sacrament of Penance before presenting themselves for Communion. Reconciliation is advised for all, no matter how light our sins may be. But the faithful struggling with ordinary sinful lives may find assurance that their participation at Mass will grant forgiveness through word, gesture and sacrament.

Reflections on the Our Father

Father . . . Abba

This a reflection from the great Doctor of the Church on prayer St. Teresa of Avila on God as our Father in a section called "Christ, Our Brother."

Oh, Son of God and my Lord! How is it that you give us so much to think about with the very first word (*Abba*)? You so humble yourself as to unite yourself with us in our petitions and to make yourself the brother of creatures so vile and miserable as we are! How is it that in the name of the Father you give us all that can be given? Is it not that you wish him to regard us as his children? Since your desire cannot go unheeded, you oblige him to fulfill it; and that is no small task. Because he is our Father, he must bear with us, despite the gravity of our offenses. He must pardon us when, like the prodigal son, we return to him. He must console us in our trials. He must

care for us in a manner becoming of a divine Father. Since he possesses all perfections, he will of necessity be a better Father than all earthly fathers. And in addition to all this, he must make us partakers of his riches and coheirs with you.

Spiritual Directions

FROM SNARLY SPEECH TO SPEECH GLORIFYING GOD (Part 3)

For the last couple of weeks, we have concentrated on the notion that as we move closer to Christ and grow in our relationship with Him, our speech gives more and more glory to God. We humans are unique in our incredible ability to communicate, and this gift of human speech is ultimately to give praise and glory to God.

We have seen that the New Testament reveals our speech can be used as a powerful weapon against others and cause great damage. Chapter 3 of the Letter of James tells us that our speech can be very difficult to control.

Jesus' insight about human speech is that it reveals what's truly in our hearts and that we'll be judged on the words we speak. We need to pray for the grace of the Holy Spirit to transform our hearts into the heart of Jesus!

We also noted that our speech should follow the great commandments of loving God and loving neighbor.

Last week, I mentioned, that St. Ignatius of Loyola suggested that when we uncharitably and with no good purpose expose the moral sin of someone else, it's as if that we ourselves committed that sin. The same holds true for venial sins!

I'll end this section of "Spiritual Directions" concerning speech with a personal story. There was a great guy in my seminary class who everyone knew was just special. He seemed so close to God. We were on a trip, and I forgot my Breviary, the pray book that priests, deacons and many lay people pray throughout the day. I asked my fiend if I could borrow his prayer book. When I

opened it, on the homemade bookmark he used to mark the correct page, my friend had written "Lord, give me the gift of charitable speech today." I then realized why my fellow seminarian was so close to God and was so different than everyone else. My friend prayed this prayer every day!

What a great prayer for all of us as we face the day and try to love God and love neighbor with our speech: **"Lord, give me the gift of charitable speech today."**

Did Jesus Really Rise From the Dead?

The Remarkable Rise of the Christian Movement

The names John the Baptist, Judas the Galilean, Simon, Anthronges, Eleazar ben Deinaus and Alexander, Menahem, Simon bar Giora, and bar-Kochba are names of leaders of Jewish movements of revolt around the time of Jesus.

In each of these movements, after the defeat of their leader by the Roman authorities, the remaining followers of these leaders were either rounded up or they melted away into the background of history.

This did not happen with the Jesus movement!!!

In the very unique case of the Jesus movement, the followers of Jesus claimed that he was had been raised from the dead and that Israel's great expectation of restoration would actually come true through the very strange and unexpected story of Jesus the Messiah.

And not only that, the followers of Jesus began to worship him and afford him divine status, which would separate them from the very synagogues they belonged and would bring about their continued persecution; and that they would proclaim this strange story to the ends of the known world.

The uniqueness of the Jesus movement leads to questions such as:

Why didn't the Jesus movement follow the patterns of other groups whose leaders had been persecuted?

Why did it uniquely consider Jesus as its continued leader after the Crucifixion?

Why did it consider Jesus (to be the fulfillment of Israel's destiny even after the Crucifixion?

Why did it organize itself so uniquely?

Why did it worship Jesus as Lord and endure persecution for that worship?

How did it become one of the most inspired and dynamically expansive missionary movements in the history of religions with a well-known, publically humiliated and executed "Messiah" as its sole leader?

An answer to each of these interesting and legitimate questions is the Resurrection of Jesus from the dead and the power of the Holy Spirit sent by Jesus upon the Christian movement at Pentecost.
