

Reflections on Parts of the Mass

The Collect

The Collect is the prayer that concludes the Introductory Rites of the Mass. The priest addresses the people, "Let us pray," signaling the purpose of the silence and the words that follow. Then he offers the prayer of the day, concluding with a formula to which everyone responds, "Amen."

The silence is important. During this time everyone is to "become aware of being in God's presence," so that they "may call to mind their intentions."

Everyone prays "together with the Priest" (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, 54)—exercising the common priesthood of the baptized. If you have come to Mass with particular needs, this silence is the time to call them to mind.

As the priest offers the prayer, he is "collecting" the thoughts of the people, who themselves have been "collect-ed" together from their homes for this celebration at church. Although it is sometimes called the "Opening Prayer" of the Mass, it is more properly and traditionally called the *Collect*.

The words express the character of the celebration. This is especially clear on occasions such as a wedding, a saint's day, and liturgical times such as Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. People attentive to the words of the Collect will discover that the priest may be articulating the purpose of the event.

At other times, the words are more generic. Many of these prayers were composed from the sixth to the eighth centuries. Some of them were written for particular liturgical days, and are still being used on or near those days over a thousand years later.

The Collect is addressed to God the Father, and it is offered through Jesus Christ in the unity of the Holy Spirit.

The priest extends his hands while he prays, using a gesture popular in Christian prayer since the earliest times.

Reflections on the Our Father

Father... Abba

In what sense is God our Father?

When commenting on the "Our Father," St. Thomas Aquinas answers this question by saying, "We call him Father by reason of him having created us in a special manner, viz. to his own image and likeness, which he did not impress on other creatures below."

One may ask, why God would create us in his image and likeness? Why would God give us a free will, an intellect and the ability to enter into loving relationships?

The obvious answer is that God greatly desires to be in an intimate and loving relationship with us! This is truly an amazing thought.

In Pope Benedict's encyclical *God is Love*, the Pope points out that certainly God has *agape* love for us. A love that is completely giving and self-sacrificial as exemplified on the Cross.

But God also has an *eros* type of love for us. Our culture has so distorted and dirtied the word "eros," we have lost its real meaning when it comes to love. *Eros* is a desirous love. A love that longs, a love that desperately seeks out the other in order to enter into an intimate relationship with him or her! That the god of the universe God, who creates us in His image and likeness, has this type of love for us is truly startling and incredible!

Spiritual Directions

FROM CURSING TO BLESSING

It is a common strategy of the Evil One to tempt us to focus on the faults and sins of others!

If we really examine our thoughts, words and sometimes even our actions, we will most likely find that many of them are focused on criticism of others! Jesus is clear that this is a dangerous spiritual trap which will poison our souls and bring about division in the Kingdom of God! The Kingdom

of the World is inundated with vitriol and criticism of others causing division and strife! This is not of God!

Jesus warns that we so easily see the splinter in our neighbor's eye while being blind to the log in our own eye! That is why focusing on the faults and sins of others is such a trap. It takes the focus away from us, the one person, with God's grace, that we can truly change! God has something so much more virtuous planned for us! In addition, it moves us away from the Lord's command to love our neighbor!

One of my Spiritual Directors in the seminary gave us great advice to help with this common temptation. When we find ourselves being critical of others, say this prayer: "God bless them, and God have mercy on me."

I love this prayer because it is filled with Christian charity. It asks God to truly bless the person we want to be critical of, while at the same time asking for God's mercy for myself and my hard-heartedness. Hopefully this put the focus back on me by praying that God's mercy will transform me into more of the image and likeness of Christ!

Did Jesus Really Rise From the Dead?

The empty tomb plus the appearances of the resurrected Jesus

The empty tomb, reported by all the Gospels, is not direct evidence of the resurrection, but it is an indirect corroboration and a pointing to the continuity of His risen body and pre-resurrection body.

Some scholars have made the claim that the empty tomb is not that important of an historical fact because there is the possibility that the body was placed somewhere else like a common grave or that the body could have been stolen.

There is a very minority opinion that the tomb may not have even been found empty. That is incredibly unlikely. Matthew would not have recorded the very unflattering and embarrassing accusation of the Jewish authorities that the disciples had stolen Jesus' body. Why would the Jewish authorities make this accusation unless they needed an explanation for a real missing body? The Jewish authorities did not deny the empty tomb, but wanted to suggest a reason why it was empty.

Others have speculated that Jesus' body was placed in some mass grave, but it seems extremely unlikely that Jesus' followers would have somehow lost track of his body.

There were known incidences of grave robbers, especially stealing the treasures from tombs, but this has been found only in Gentile regions, not Jewish ones.

And the disciples stealing the body of Jesus doesn't make much sense considering their future actions of proclaiming the Gospel to the entire known world against incredible odds, great tribulations and the martyrdom of many of them. People certainly die for their beliefs, but do not voluntarily die for what they would have known to be false, that is that Jesus did not rise from the dead because his body was stolen by the very ones proclaiming his resurrection.

The various and diverse eyewitness accounts of the Risen Jesus in a glorified body <u>plus</u> the fact of the empty tomb, certainly supports the historicity of the resurrection.
