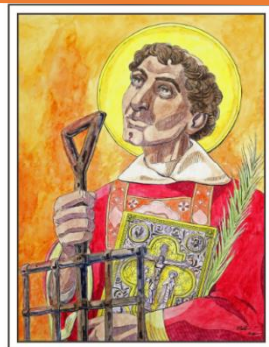

### The Year of the Jubilee 2025: Pilgrims of Hope

The Holy Father has announced that 2025 will be a Jubilee Year, something which happens every 25 years. The theme for Jubilee 2025 is “Pilgrims of Hope,” and it will be a year of hope for a world suffering the impacts of war, the ongoing effects of COVID-19 pandemic, and the climate crisis.

#### What is a Jubilee?

“Jubilee” is the name given to a particular year. A time to re-establish a proper relationship with God, with one another, and with all of Creation.

#### Jubilees throughout History

In the Catholic Church, the concept of Jubilee or ‘Holy Year’ was used to declare special years for

forgiveness and reconciliation. The first Jubilee was declared by Pope Boniface VIII on 22nd February 1300 (Feast of the Chair of St. Peter), to mark the beginning of that century. He later recommended it occurring every 100 years.

### Year of the Council

In the letter that Pope Francis wrote in preparation for the Jubilee Year of 2025, he said that “The four Constitutions of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council, together with the Magisterium of these recent decades, will continue to provide direction and guidance to God’s holy people, so that it can press forward in its mission of bringing the joyful proclamation of the Gospel to everyone.”

### The Jubilee Prayer

Father in heaven,  
may the faith you have given us  
in your son, Jesus Christ, our brother,  
and the flame of charity enkindled  
in our hearts by the Holy Spirit,  
reawaken in us the blessed hope  
for the coming of your Kingdom.

May your grace transform us  
into tireless cultivators of the seeds of the Gospel.  
May those seeds transform from within both humanity and the whole cosmos  
in the sure expectation  
of a new heaven and a new earth,  
when, with the powers of Evil vanquished,  
your glory will shine eternally.

May the grace of the Jubilee  
reawaken in us, Pilgrims of Hope,  
a yearning for the treasures of heaven.  
May that same grace spread  
the joy and peace of our Redeemer  
throughout the earth.

To you our God, eternally blessed,  
be glory and praise forever.

## Spiritual Directions

---

### **A key to overcoming vice is practicing the opposite virtue**

*If you want to overcome a vice that you can't seem to stop, one effective remedy is to intentionally practice the opposite virtue.*

Many of us have difficulty with a particular vice in our lives, a vice that we can't seem to quit.

While there are a variety of ways to stop a vice, one of the most effective ways is to practice the opposite virtue.

This is a method promoted by many saints over the years.

#### Fight vice with virtue

St. Francis de Sales recommends this approach in his Introduction to the Devout Life:

"When we are beset by any particular vice, it is well as far as possible to make the opposite virtue our special aim, and turn everything to that account; so doing, we shall overcome our enemy, and meanwhile make progress in all virtue."

He then gives specific examples as to how someone would put this method into action:

"Thus, if I am beset with pride or anger, I must above all else strive to cultivate humility and gentleness, and I must turn all my religious exercises,—prayer, sacraments, prudence, constancy, moderation, to the same object."

St. Francis de Sales also suggests that our practice of virtue needs to be strengthened by other virtues, as they are all interconnected:

"The wild boar sharpens its tusks by grinding them against its other teeth, which by the same process are sharpened and pointed; and so when a good man endeavors to perfect himself in some virtue which he is conscious of specially needing, he ought to give it edge and point by the aid of other virtues, which will themselves be confirmed and strengthened as he uses them with that object."

Above all, we need to be conscious of our own vices and to do what we can to root them out. It will not be easy, but if we focus our attention on one particular vice with its opposing virtue, we will have a greater chance of success. *From Aleteia by Philip Kosloski - published on 01/17/25*

## **Why Psalm 23 gave hope to early Christians**

*In the midst of a dark world, Christians in the first few centuries were drawn to Psalm 23 and the figure of Jesus as the Good Shepherd.*

Hope can be a difficult virtue to obtain, especially when it is not rooted in an ardent faith in God. Without faith, the world can seem like a very dark place, where sadness and anxiety prevail.

Early Christians also struggled with hope, but their hearts were lifted-up in hope after reading Psalm 23.

### The Shepherd

Pope Benedict XVI refers to the experience of early Christians in his encyclical, *Spe salvi*, and how the Good Shepherd spoke to their hearts:

"[I]through the figure of the shepherd the early Church could identify with existing models of Roman art. There the shepherd was generally an expression of the dream of a tranquil and simple life, for which the people, amid the confusion of the big cities, felt a certain longing. Now the image was read as part of a new scenario which gave it a deeper content: "The Lord is my shepherd: I shall not want ... Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I fear no evil, because you are with me ..." (Ps 23 [22]:1, 4)."

Pope Benedict XVI expands on this image, linking it to Christ:

"The true shepherd is one who knows even the path that passes through the valley of death; one who walks with me even on the path of final solitude, where no one can accompany me, guiding me through: he himself has walked this path, he has descended into the kingdom of death, he has conquered death, and he has returned to accompany us now and to give us the certainty that, together with him, we can find a way through"

This image of the Good Shepherd gave hope to the early Christians, as Pope Benedict XVI concludes:

"The realization that there is One who even in death accompanies me, and with his "rod and his staff comforts me," so that "I fear no evil" (cf. Ps 23 [22]:4)—this was the new "hope" that arose over the life of believers."

If you are ever struggling with hope, read Psalm 23 and trust that Jesus, the Good Shepherd, is there with you through your darkest days and is guiding you to greener pastures.

## Word of God Sunday

---

### Breaking Open the Word

In the popular public television program *Antiques Roadshow*, people from around the country bring their treasures to be appraised by various experts. An antique might be a cherished family heirloom displayed proudly in a prominent place in the home, or a long-forgotten trinket gathering dust on a shelf in the attic. Whatever the item, the owner is usually surprised to hear the expert's comments. The appraiser might put a low-price tag on something the owner thought had great value. And what was originally purchased for a few dollars sometimes turns out to be a prized collector's item now valued at thousands of dollars.

Take a look around your home. What is your family's most valued possession? Is it an object, a person, a relationship? How does your family express delight and pride in this treasured possession?

The Second Vatican Council teaches that "the treasures of the Bible are to be opened up more lavishly so that a richer fare may be provided for the faithful at the table of God's Word" (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy [Sacrosanctum Concilium], no. 51, in Vatican Council II: Volume 1: The Conciliar and Post Conciliar Documents, new rev. ed., ed. Austin Flannery [Collegeville, MN: Liturgical Press, 1996]). Do we consider the Bible a treasure, a special table around which the family gathers? Is the family Bible among your home's most valuable possessions? As we consider practical ways to share the Word of God at home, perhaps we will be surprised to discover that the family Bible, regardless of whether it is prominently displayed or is gathering dust on an attic shelf, is one of the most valuable spiritual treasures in a Christian home.

### Reading, Reflecting, Renewing

Begin to break open God's Word in your home by dedicating some family time each week for a brief reading of a Scripture passage, perhaps the Sunday Gospel. Given the hectic and stressed pace of life and our typically overworked schedules, making family time for the Bible reminds us of the need to put God first. Gathering around the table of God's Word enriches and strengthens the experience of family as a "domestic Church."

Choose a comfortable and quiet place in the home, away from the distractions of television and ringing telephones. Read the passage aloud, and then allow some time for the family to reflect on and share its meaning together. Since Sacred Scripture is the "speech of God as it is put down in writing under the breath of the Holy Spirit" (CCC, no. 81, quoting Second Vatican Council, *Dei Verbum*, no. 9), this time dedicated to reading puts your family into living communication with God. Remind everyone gathered that this family activity brings them to a living encounter with Christ, who is present as the Word among them.

### From the USCCB

Opening up the Bible can be a challenging and daunting endeavor. Try beginning with Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, Matthew 5-7. Three short chapters that summarize much of Jesus' teaching!

Insurance is NOT necessary, and appointments are limited. Stroke Scan will be available at the church for you to register on Saturday, February 1st - Sunday, February 2nd, or please call 832-437-7355 to schedule an appointment today for you or a loved one. The screenings will take place in the Family Life Center.
